far. Stay close to home if you can, explore what's around you, visit outdoor spaces near your town or city that perhaps you've previously overlooked. I guarantee there's much more in your immediate surroundings than you've ever been aware of. I heard the chef and Bake Off Queen Prue Leith talk recently about being locked down in the Cotswolds; she's lived there for 45 years and for the first time she's been taking a right turn instead of a left turn out of her house and she's discovered wetlands and nature reserves she didn't even know existed.

When I presented Britain's Favourite Walks: Top 100 on ITV a couple of years ago it was amazing how many of them, voted for by the public, were close to major cities and towns.

Number 70 on the list was the Sandstone Trail, a 34-mile north-south trek from the Cheshire town of Frodsham to the north Shropshire town of Whitchurch. It's within easy reach of Liverpool, Chester and Stoke-on-Trent and passes barely more than a mile from our Delamere Forest Club Site, taking in some lovely sights along the way.

It was also encouraging to see some real classics in there too. Number 13 on the list (though far from unlucky for anyone living nearby) is the South Downs Way. Stretching all the way from Winchester in Hampshire, following the natural ridge of the downs all the way to Eastbourne in Sussex, this 100-mile National Trail is no mean feat to walk in its entirety, but it's possible to stop off at one of the Club Sites at Chichester, Graffham, Slindon or Normans Bay to break it up into sections. It's perfect for anyone living around the south coast cities of Southampton, Portsmouth and Brighton.

All of these walks can be found online at theoutdoorguide.co.uk, so have a look and check out what's close to you.

Many of these have Club Sites local to them, and with a bit of luck and careful planning from us all, we hope these will be a holiday option for everyone again this summer.
